Play supports language development, sequencing and spatial awareness. These skills underpin sentence construction and layout of text on the page.

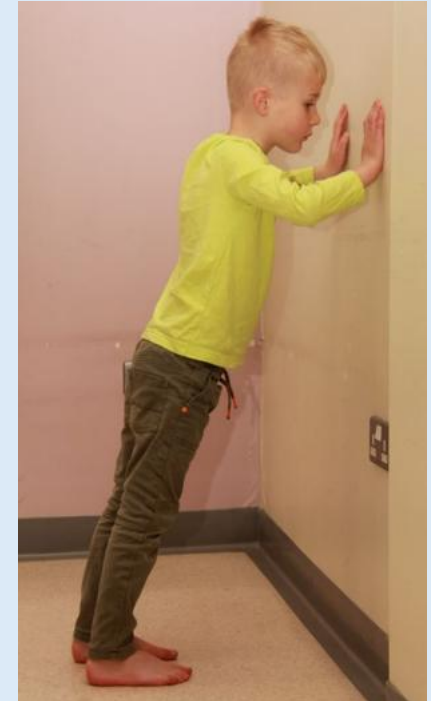

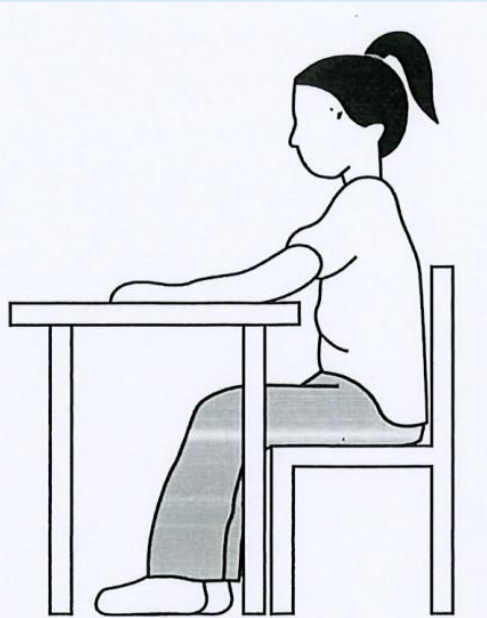
Book Position for
