

Dear Parents and Carers

I hope this letter finds you well and that you have had a good summer break with your children. Our summer improvement, enhancement and routine building works are all now complete, the schools are cleaned and ready to open and the teachers are preparing exciting learning activities for the new term. We are all very much looking forward to welcoming our pupils back and to meeting our new reception classes.

Below you will find information regarding our arrangements, planning and response to COVID19 for the start of term. You will have seen in the press that due to the high rates of infection across the South West at the moment, Cornwall and Devon have been moved to an Enhanced Response Area (ERA) by central government. This means that authorities across the South West have more flexibility to introduce public health measures if considered necessary.

This response will last for five weeks initially and will be reviewed after four. <u>https://www.cornwall.gov.uk/council-news/health-wellbeing-and-social-care/cornwall-designated-enhanced-response-area-to-help-tackle-rise-in-covid-cases/</u>.

Our Aspire Health and Safety team have been busy this week consulting with and taking the most up-to-date advice from Public Health England, the Department for Education and the Cornwall Local Authority teams. All individual school risk assessments have been updated and signed off by the health and safety teams and a COVID Outbreak Management Plan is in place.

Our planning has been based on balancing the need for the children to have an enjoyable start to their school year with a necessity to reduce any further disruption to their education and to keep the children, families and our staff as safe as we can.

Bubbles: Children will no longer be grouped in 'bubbles.' They will however be grouped in their normal classes and we will endeavour to keep children within their class groupings whilst learning indoors. We will avoid classes mixing inside the buildings as much as possible.

Large indoor assemblies and gatherings will NOT take place for at least the first five weeks. Assemblies will take place remotely and children will stay in their classes.

If an individual school has an outbreak of confirmed COVID infections we may consider temporary re-introduction of bubbles if advised to do so by the South West Health Protection Team.

Break times and lunch time: Children will be able to play freely and with their friends whilst outside. There will be no designated zones for bubbles and children will be able to mix with other classes.

During lunch the dining halls/rooms will run as normal. Windows and doors will be opened to ensure good ventilation. All children will wash their hands/use sanitiser before entering/leaving the dining hall.

Carbon Dioxide Monitors: The government has announced that they will be providing monitors to schools to enable us to take readings from across the indoor spaces in our schools, providing reassurance that existing ventilation measures are working, and helping balance the need for good ventilation with keeping classrooms warm. At this time procurement has not yet been finalised and we do not yet have a date for delivery. When we have more information on this we will let you know.

Cleaning: Our cleaning contractors will continue to carry out high level cleaning regimes for the whole term. Additional cleaning during the day will take place for highly used areas and frequently touched areas/resources. Children will use their own equipment where possible.

Covid Response Flowchart: Please see Appendix 1 below for a chart of measures we will take should there be a rise in cases in any individual school.

Covid contact tracing and self-isolation: From 19th July schools were no longer expected or able to undertake contact tracing. Schools will not be asking families to keep their children home to isolate nor asking any member of staff to isolate unless they have Covid symptoms. This is now undertaken completely by NHS Test and Trace.

As with positive cases in any other setting, NHS Test and Trace will work with the positive case and/or their parents to identify close contacts. This is likely to be a small number of individuals who would be most at risk of contracting COVID-19 due to the nature of the close contact. As parents or carers, you may be contacted to help with identifying close contacts.

Individuals are not required to self-isolate if they live in the same household as someone with COVID-19, or are a close contact of someone with COVID-19, and any of the following apply:

- they are fully vaccinated
- they are below the age of 18 years and 6 months
- they have taken part in or are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial
- they are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons

Instead, NHS Test and Trace will inform affected individuals, children or their parents or carers that they have been in close contact with a positive case and advise them to take a PCR test.

Do not send your child to their school if:

- they are showing one or more <u>coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms</u>
- they have had a positive test result

Pupils should only self-isolate if they have symptoms or if they get a positive PCR test

Curriculum and Wellbeing: We are returning to our full and exciting curriculum plans and all subjects will once again be taught as normal. We understand there will be gaps in learning and teachers we will continue to plan for catch up for individual children.

We also understand that all children have experienced a great deal of disruption and chaos in their learning and school life and many children have experienced personal traumas as well. Pastoral care and mental health and wellbeing of children is at the top of our agenda and our staff are skilled in recognising, supporting and helping children with social, emotional and physical wellbeing needs. There may also be a reduction in confidence and resilience levels as well as social anxieties for some children.

Please ensure you talk to your child's teacher about any specific concerns you have regarding your child/children's return to school.

Drop off/pick up procedures:

will be continuing with the staggered start and finish times, and we politely ask that you continue to socially distance and wear a mask at the gates for the first five weeks.

Education and support for pupils at home: Should your child/children need to isolate and stay at home but remain well, we will provide remote education that meets the same quality and quantity of education that pupils would receive in school.

The school will continue to provide food vouchers for pupils eligible for benefits-related free school meals while they are not attending school because of COVID-19 isolation guidelines.

Face Coverings: Children are not required to wear a face covering at any time. We are requesting that staff, visitors and parents do wear a face covering in communal areas of the schools for the next five weeks. We politely ask parents to please continue to wear a mask if entering the school buildings.

Hygiene

Hand hygiene

Frequent and thorough hand cleaning will be a regular practice for all children and adults. Staff will continue to ensure that pupils clean their hands regularly with soap and water or hand sanitiser. Respiratory hygiene

The 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach continues to be very important and will be followed in our schools.

LFD testing: All school staff will be asked to continue with twice weekly Lateral Flow Device testing.

Staffing: Thank you all again for your endless patience and understanding during the last 18 months. We endeavour to ensure your children are taught by their familiar adults, but we do expect some disruption with staff shortages due to sickness and/or need to isolate (as many workplaces in Cornwall are experiencing at this time with cases rising)

Our fabulous staff in our schools will always 'go the extra mile' to ensure that children are cared for by familiar adults whenever possible. We ask for your continued support should we need to cover your child's class short term with unfamiliar (but qualified and experienced) adults.

Uniform: All children will be expected to return in their full school uniforms, please and with their PE kits. Please ensure school shoes are plain black, 'brand name' logo free.

We wish to ensure our uniforms are affordable and accessible. High street alternatives to branded school uniforms are very acceptable and the school has a small amount of second hand uniform available for parents you are in need of it.

If you have good condition uniform items your child has outgrown, please consider donating these back to your school so another family can make use of them.

Ventilation: We will ensure our schools are well ventilated and that a comfortable teaching environment is maintained.

Any poorly ventilated spaces will be identified as part of the risk assessment process and steps taken to improve fresh air flow in these areas.

Wraparound and Clubs: For the majority of our schools these will now continue as normal. Your school will be communicating directly with you regarding arrangements. Please be aware however that whilst case rates are high in Cornwall it is possible that staff shortages may cause some disruption to clubs and after/before school activities.

Appendix 1

When should my child self- isolate or miss school?	NO ·	All children MUST attend school unless they are unwell. From 16 th August 2021, children under 18 (or double-vaccinated adults) do not need to self-isolate or miss school if a member of their household or a close contact, has COVID. Instead, they will need to book a PCR test but can continue coming to school so long as they have no symptoms and the test result is negative.
	YES .	If your child develops COVID symptoms at home, they should <u>stay at home</u> and should book a PCR test), <u>NOT</u> a Lateral Flow test. If your child develops COVID symptoms at school, they will be sent home and you should book them a PCR test. If your child tests positive for COVID, they will need to self- isolate. The rest of the household does not need to self-isolate if they are under 18 or fully vaccinated – but should book a PCR test.
